We celebrate one Mass on Sundays. Please note the revised time and location. This schedule accommodates those who also attend the ecumenical service in the Amphitheater (10:45 a.m.) as well as those who wish to join lunch arrangements such as the Fire Department chicken barbecues. As in the past, there is no Sunday Mass on the final day of the program season (August 24).

## **Catholic Sister Scholarship Recipients to Visit Catholic House and Conduct Seminars**

The Chautauqua Catholic Community provides scholarships to four women religious each year to spend one week at Catholic House. The scholarship includes lodging, gate passes, parking, and a stipend for meals. This year, we welcome four Sisters of St. Joseph from Rochester, NY: Sr. Donna Del Santo, Sr. Marilyn Pray, Sr. Pat Trovato, and Sr. Pat McDermott. These women will share experiences from their ministries at our Friday seminars during Week 1 and Week 6. The sisters' scholarships are funded by generous donations to the Chautauqua Catholic Community. ### **Sr. Donna Del Santo, SSJ (Week 1)**

Sr. Donna Del Santo, a public health nurse, helped create two health centers where volunteers serve workers in poverty who have limited access to health care. She has offered nursing, Catholic services, and musical talent in the Monroe County Jail in Rochester for over 40 years. Sr. Donna is certified in Spiritual Direction for the Ignatian Exercises. She has coordinated the St. Joseph Volunteer Corps. She lives in community with youth and other sisters and serves as the congregation's Director of Vocations. She also serves as Campus Minister for Discernment and Vocation for Nazareth University's Center for Spirituality. Sister Donna has a love of nature, camping, canoeing, and gardening.



### **Sr. Marilyn Pray, SSJ (Week 1)**



Sr. Marilyn Pray has been a teacher, a congregational leader, and Director of St. Joseph's House, a Catholic Worker House of Hospitality in Rochester. There, she served the homeless, the incarcerated, and those caught in addiction. Sr. Marilyn then became involved in nonviolent anti-war and anti-nuclear demonstrations. She completed a Doctor of Ministry in pastoral care and counseling. With other sisters, she established a counseling program at St. Joseph's Neighborhood Center founded by Sr. Marilyn and fellow sisters. A certified spiritual director and counselor, she now ministers to those in deep poverty through Rochester Hope. She lives in community with sisters, youth, and young adults from all walks of life. She enjoys bicycling, hiking, reading, and is learning to be a beekeeper.

### **Sr. Patricia (Pat) Trovato, SSJ (Week 6)**

Sr. Pat Trovato loves serving the needy through education. She interrupted her education to handle a "two-week" teaching assignment that lasted for eight years. She completed her BA and Master's degrees and taught for 56 years in communities of varied economic circumstances. Sr. Pat taught on a Native American reservation in Green Bay, Wisconsin. She also served as a counselor/teacher at an in-patient facility for drug- and alcohol-addicted teens. She worked in Academic Intervention Services for many years. In the Altarbread Department of the SSJ Motherhouse, she packs and ships hosts to religious institutions. Sr. Pat treasures connections with family, relationships with former students, and her rescue dog, Gracie. Her diamond jubilee year in the SSJ will occur in 2026.



### **Sr. Patricia (Pat) McDermott, SSJ (Week 6)**



Sr. Pat McDermott taught in Catholic schools for over 40 years. Trained in special education, she served the developmentally disabled and those with auditory processing problems. She also taught technology and even worked as a substitute teacher in a public school district. Having diverse interests, she studied and then performed ultrasounds. She works as an administrative assistant, substitute teacher, and pre-school teacher's assistant in a Sisters of St. Joseph school. Sister Pat also directs the SSJ Altarbread Department, managing parish orders and invoices for hosts, and she works as a cashier in the SSJ Motherhouse gift shop. As a former trumpet player, Sr. Pat sings and especially loves trumpet music, family time, travel, and animals, including Gracie, a rescue dog in her community. Her golden jubilee year in the SSJ will occur in 2026.

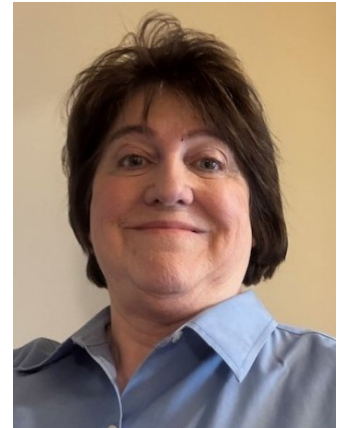


## CCC Welcomes New Board Members

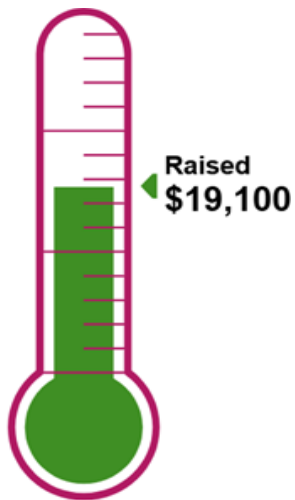

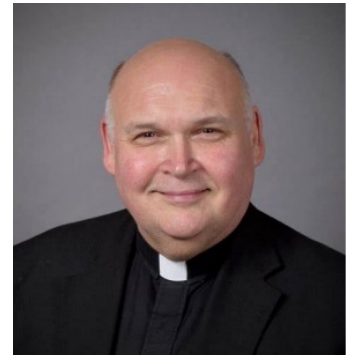
## 2025 Chaplains of the Week

**Rev. Paul D. Seil** was ordained in 1989 after seven years as a civil servant in Buffalo, NY, facilitating employment and training placements for underserved populations. After parochial assignments, he served as a pastor for 20 years prior to retirement in January, 2025. For 20 years, Fr. Paul hosted an award-winning television program, “Our Daily Bread,” featuring community members cooking and discussing community service. Fr. Paul serves as Chaplain for the Buffalo Fire Department, a role he has held since 2018, and he is a COVID-Unit Chaplain for Catholic Health Association. He will be our Chaplain during Week 1.

**Rev. John M. Jerek** is a native of Youngstown, OH. He is pastor of St. Brendan, St. Christine, and Our Lady of Sorrows parishes in Youngstown. Fr. John has been a pastor for 28 years. He served on the faculty of John F. Kennedy Catholic High School, has been the Diocesan Director of Campus Ministry, and held the role of Vicar for Clergy. **Rev. Christopher L. Lowe** is the pastor of St. Michael Parish and School in Lowell, MA. After his wife of 30 years died, he entered Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary and was ordained a priest in 2015. He earned a BS in Chemical Engineering from the University of Maine in Orono, where he met his wife, Carmen. To support a career shift to computer programming, Fr. Chris earned a Master’s in computer science from Worcester Polytech Institute. Carmen predicted that if anything were to happen to her, he would become a priest. Although not blessed with children, they had wonderful years together until her death in 2009 after a long illness. All Fr. Chris wants now is to be a parish priest. Before the seminary, Fr. Ryan was an elementary and middle school teacher and a corps member of Teach for America, an AmeriCorps program. He graduated from Christ the King Seminary in East Aurora, NY and was ordained in 2021. Fr. Ryan serves Parish Family No. 7 south of Buffalo. He has particular interest in hospital and prison ministry, Sacraments of Healing, preaching, and supporting mental health challenges. He will be our Chaplain during Week 5.

**Rev. Anthony F. Rigoli, OMI** was born and raised in Buffalo, NY and grew up in an Oblates parish. He entered the Oblates of Mary Immaculate and was ordained in 1972. Fr. ### Jill Peláez Baumgaertner, PhD (Friday, Week 3)

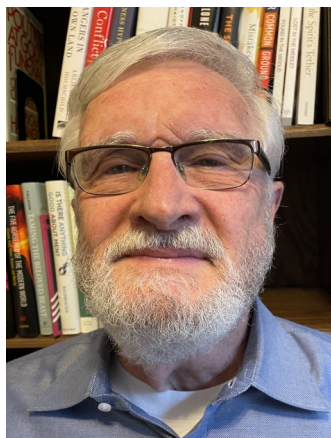
#### Flannery O'Connor: Culture Shock!

Dr. Peláez Baumgaertner taught English at Wheaton College, Juniata College, and Valparaíso University. A Fulbright Scholar, she also taught in Spain. She serves as Poetry Editor of *The Christian Century*. A prolific author, Dr. Peláez Baumgaertner received numerous awards and honors for her publications and academic work. She is an expert on Flannery O'Connor, one of America's greatest fiction writers and the writer whose Catholic faith is central to understanding her sometimes shocking stories. Although there were Catholic writers before her, O'Connor became the progenitor for twentieth-century writers of faith. Dr. Peláez Baumgaertner is the author of *Flannery O'Connor: A Proper Scaring*. She will speak about how the shocks that O'Connor's writings provided have led to reactions that are steps toward the truth: befuddlement, anger, grief, and curiosity. Resistance comes first, then revelation—just as it occurs in O'Connor's characters.



### Michael McGillicuddy (Friday, Week 4)

#### "I was in prison and you came to visit me (Matthew 25:36, 40)



Michael McGillicuddy served as a human resource director for Chicago's Federal Correction Center. He retired from a dual career as a licensed clinical social worker and a financial planner. He also taught at a county prison farm while a college student in Memphis. He has served for the past ten years in the Ignatian Volunteer Corps, where he is assigned to Precious Blood Ministry of Reconciliation to facilitate groups inside Chicago's Cook County Jail (work he finds greatly rewarding). Mr. McGillicuddy will discuss incarceration and recidivism, building social capital by engaging with affected individuals, and restorative justice organizations such as the Catholic Prison Ministry Coalition, One Parish One Prisoner, Precious Blood Ministry of Reconciliation, and the Ignatian Volunteer Corps.

### Jon Schmitz (Friday, Week 5)

#### ***The Narrow Gate Pass: How Chautauqua Came to Include American Catholicism***

Jon Schmitz is well-known to Chautauquans as the archivist and historian for Chautauqua Institution. He collects and processes records relating to Chautauqua's history, conducts research, and organizes the Heritage Lectures at Chautauqua, many of which he presents. He holds a master's degree in diplomatic history from the University of Toronto and is a member of the Academy of Certified Archivists. Mr. Schmitz held various records management and records inspector roles and taught record management, archives, and preservation at George Brown College in Toronto. He has performed extensive service through the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and is a past president of the Chautauqua Catholic Community. He will explain how Chautauqua came to include Catholics.

### **Dave Johnson, PhD, LCSW, LMFT, CNS-BC (Friday, Week 7)** ***The Intersection of Prayer, Meditation, and Self-Care in an Era of Burnout***

Dr. Johnson is a professor of nursing at the University of St. Francis and a psychiatric clinical nurse specialist, licensed clinical social worker, and marriage and family therapist at Parkview Health in Fort Wayne, IN. In addition, he is an Associate of the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ. Their mission upholds social justice, provides compassionate care for sick and underprivileged, and fosters empowerment. In a fast-paced, “autopilot” world with multiple competing, complex, global, and conflicting demands, Dr. Johnson finds prayer and meditation to be the heart and soul of mindful self-care. He will guide us to reset and build the healing power inherent within the beauty of nature, gratitude, and compassion that is vitally needed in a world swirling with burnout.

### **Rita Houlihan (Friday, Week 8)**

#### ***Mary Magdalene: Legends vs. Scripture - Persecution vs. Resurrection***

Rita works to restore our historical memory of Biblical women leaders with a focus on Mary Magdalene, the first disciple to whom Jesus revealed his resurrection. To honor Jesus’s choice and to counter the false “penitent sinner” legends, Rita commissions art presenting Mary Magdalene as she appears in the canonical Gospels: the disciple from Galilee who was first to proclaim, “I have seen the Lord!” Below are links to art and scholarship that “Reclaim Magdalene” including Laura James’s stunning art related to Mary Magdalene.
